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## Important June dates up to 1776

Jun 1, 1774 The port of Boston MA is closed to shipping by The British Parliament

Jun 3, 1775 Gen. Moultrie prepares for an attack on Fort Sullivan in Charleston SC

Jun 5, 1775 The first "Liberty Pole" goes up in Savannah GA

Jun 6, 1774 Connecticut issued a "Declaration of Independence"

Jun 6, 1776 Battle of Three Rivers, Canada

Jun 7, 1776 Resolutions that These united colonies are, and of right ought to be free and independent States, introduced in Congress by Richard Henry Lee

Jun 8, 1776 The battle at Three Rivers, Canada, ends in an American tragedy

Jun 9, 1772 The British sloop "Gaspee" is burned at Providence RI in the first act of rebellion against King George III

Jun 10, 1776 Congress authorized a Permanent "War and Ordinance Board" to supply the military

Jun 11, 1774 New Jersey enacted a "Declaration of Rights"

Jun 11, 1776 New York virtually declares for Independence Jun 12, 1775 British Gen. Gage put all of Massachusetts under his rule of martial law

Jun 12, 1775 The British ship Margaretta was seized at Machias ME (then MA)

Jun 12, 1776 Virginia proclaimed "The Rights of Man"

Jun 13, 1776 Gen. Lee reviews the garrison and fortifications at Fort Moultrie in Charleston SC

Jun 14, 1776 Connecticut instructs her delegates to vote for Independence

Jun 15, 1775 Congress appointed George Washington to be Commander-in-Chief of the Army. He refused a salary and accepted only expenses.

Jun 15, 1776 Delaware declared for Independence

Jun 15, 1776 New Hampshire declared for Independence

Jun 16, 1776 Engagement at Chambly, Canada

Jun 17, 1742 William Hooper was born in Massachusetts. He was a signer of the Declaration of Independence for North Carolina.

Jun 17, 1775 Battle of Bunker Hill [actually Breed's Hill] outside of Boston MA was won by the British but at a heavy cost in officers and men. Jun 17, 1775 Siege of Boston MA

Jun 19, 1776 Frederick County MD proposed that Mennonites and Quakers not be exempted from military service.

Jun 20, 1776 Washington received his commission and started out for Cambridge MA.

Jun 21, 1731 Martha Dandridge was born in Virginia. She became the wife of George Washington.

Jun 22, 1774 The colony of Canada was given all the land west of the Appalachian Mountains up to the Mississippi River in order to keep it neutral in the struggle between the lower thirteen colonies and England.

Jun 23, 1775 The newlycommissioned Commanderin-Chief George Washington is escorted out of Philadelphia by Massachusetts troops.

Jun 24, 1776 American troops retreat from Montreal, Canada

Jun 24, 1776 Engagement at Isle aux Noix, Canada

Jun 26, 1742 Arthur Midleton was born in South Carolina. He was a signer of the Declaration of Independence for South Carolina.

Jun 28, 1776 Maryland declares for Independence

Jun 28, 1776 British Adm. Parker is repulsed at Fort Moultrie, Charleston SC.

Jun 28, 1776 Battle at Fort Sullivan (Sullivan's Island) SC.

Jun 29, 1767 Parliament passed an act imposing duties on glass, paper, painters' colors and tea imported into the American Colonies.

Jun 29, 1774 Delaware issued its "Declaration of Rights"
