Important October dates up to 1776

Oct 1, 1730 Richard Stockton is born in New Jersey. He later signs the Declaration of Independence for New Jersey.

Oct 1, 1768 British troops arrive and occupy Boston.

Oct 2, 1773 Philadelphia PA citizens resist the tea tax.

Oct 5, 1775 Congress authorizes the use of two armed vessels. This is the origin of our Navy.

Oct 7, 1728 Caesar Rodney is born in Dover PA (now DE). He later signs the Declaration of Independence for Delaware.

Oct 7, 1775 Engagement at Bristol RI.

Oct 10, 1774 Colonial forces from Virginia under Col. Lewis fight off an attack by Indians under Chief Cornstalk at Point Pleasant VA (now WV)

Oct 12, 1776 Skirmish at Throg's Neck NY

Oct 12, 1776 Thomas Jefferson proposes a bill to deny all legal claims of the English.

Oct 14, 1734 Francis Lightfoot Lee is born in Westmoreland County, Virginia. He later signs the Declaration of Independence for Virginia.

Oct 14, 1776 British Gen. Carleton lands at Crown Point NY, on the way to attack Fort Ticonderoga. Oct 16, 1776 Engagement at Harlem Heights NY.

Oct 17, 1775 Burning of Falmouth ME.

Oct 18, 1775 Surrender of Fort Chambly in Canada.

Oct 18, 1775 Engagement at Falmouth ME

Oct 18, 1776 Engagement at Pell's Point NY.

Oct 18, 1776 Engagement at Pelham Manor NY

Oct 18, 1776 Engagement at New Rochelle NY.

Oct 19, 1774 The brig Peggy Stewart, loaded with tea, is burned by patriots at Annapolis MD.

Oct 19, 1775 Engagement at Chambly in Canada

Oct 22, 1774 The First Continental Congress adjourns in Philadelphia PA.

Oct 23, 1776 Washington makes his headquarters at While Plains NY

Oct 24, 1770 British soldiers

from Capt. Preston's Royal Guard are tried for murder in the "Boston Massacre". They are acquitted after a defense supplied by John Adams (later to become President of the U.S.)

Oct 25, 1765 The Stamp Act Congress adjourns and violence breaks out.

Oct 26, 1774 The Continental Congress asks John Adams to draft an appeal to British King George for justice.

Oct 26, 1775 Battle of Hampton VA.

Oct 26, 1776 Benjamin Franklin sails to France as our first ambassador.

Oct 27, 1776 A British attack by land and sea on Fort Washington (outside New York City) is repulsed.

Oct 28, 1776 The British win the battle of White Plains NY, but suffer many casualties.

Oct 28, 1776 Engagement at Chatterton's Hill. NY

Oct 30, 1735 John Adams is born in Massachusetts. He later signed the Declaration of Independence and became the second President of the united States.

Oct 31, 1740 William Paca is born in Maryland. He later signed the Declaration of Independence for Maryland. He was one of the first to call for a Bill of Rights.

Oct 31, 1775 The Emperor of Russia turns down an appeal by the British to provide mercenary troops for the war in America.

Oct 31, 1775 British Gen. Carleton is repulsed by Gen. Montgomery at the crossing of the St. Lawrence River.
